Challenge Facility for Civil Society - second round applications due 22 August



The Stop TB Partnership announced on 2 July the second round of the Partnership's Challenge Facility for Civil Society (CFCS). The CFCS aims to make the voices of vulnerable communities, including those affected by tuberculosis, heard by local and

national policy makers. This facility will support civil society activities designed to attract greater attention from governments to the prevention, treatment and control of this often lethal yet curable disease.

First HIV/TB Global Leaders' Forum held on June 9, 2008



On the eve of the 2008 High-level meeting on AIDS, government leaders, health and business officials, heads of United Nations agencies and activists gathered at UN Headquarters in New York to discuss how to better combat the co-epidemic of HIV/TB through better collaboration, coordinated planning and greater investment in new tools to combat the "dynamic duo".

Leaders present at the Forum included: the President of Togo, the President of Mozambique, the First Lady of Rwanda, The Secretary-General of the United Nations, The President of the General Assembly, former Presidents William J. Clinton and Jorge Sampaio, the Heads of WHO, UNAIDS, The Global Fund, VP of the World Bank and over 30 Ministers of Health, among others.

ACSM Working Group members and other Partners played a significant role in disseminating information to key media outlets in their respective countries. In particular, Health and Development Networks helped place op-eds in major newspapers in 14 countries worldwide. The Private Sector Constituency meeting brought business leaders of health and non-health related companies to discuss and showcase best practices of how the business sector is engaging in different ways in the fight to stop TB. Different industries were able to show concrete actions and future plans of activities that are both related and not related to their core businesses. A presentation from the Kempinski Hotel Group highlighted the innovative and comparative advantage the private sector holds in being able to raise awareness and outreach to the public at large even if their core business is not health related.

ACSM Workshop held in Cambodia



The Cambodian National TB Program, with technical support from Program for Appropriate Technology in Health (PATH), organized a one-day Introduction to ACSM for TB Control Workshop on 12 June in Phnom Penh. Close to 60 communications and programme staff from 18 local and international NGOs attended the Workshop, aimed at giving participants an introduction to ACSM and how strategic

implementation can have impact in helping Cambodia reach its national TB case detection and treatment goals. PATH is currently supporting the Cambodian NTP ACSM team to develop the national ACSM strategy for TB control. Both the Workshop and the development of the ACSM strategy is being supported with USAID funds.

NEW PUBLICATIONS

Community involvement in TB care and prevention: towards partnerships for health

This WHO publication provides guiding principles for countries to promote the involvement of people with TB and the community in TB care and prevention. These recommendations are designed to support health policy-makers – and patients' groups and local partners – in including community involvement activities in national strategic plans to control TB. The

recommendations also offer advice on how to fund this work and successfully scale up approaches that have worked effectively.

The urgent need to engage and involve people with TB and the community as partners in rolling out the Stop TB Strategy requires clearly understanding the essential terms used in this area and the values and principles that underpin effective and sustainable community-based initiatives. The expansion of community-based Tuberculosis programming: critical program design issues for new partners

In response to the increasing burden of TB on the developing world and the call for NGO involvement in combating the problem, CORE Group's TB Working Group has released a publication which outlines nine project design challenges most likely to face those working at the community level and seeking to implement a TB prevention or treatment programme.

This publication grew out of a 2007 TB Working Group meeting and reflects participant discussions and lessons learned that were articulated throughout the event.
