PROJECT OBJECTIVES

- To engage 100 TB Survivors and 800 community leaders in demand generation activities for TB services
- To reach approximately 130 missing TB people and support the process of ensuring their access to TB treatment, working in close collaboration with local health facilities and community systems

PROJECT ACTIVITIES

- Training 100 TB survivors and 800 community leaders on raising awareness about TB, linking those presumptive of TB to health facilities, supporting the process of sputum collection and transportation and supporting those diagnosed of TB through treatment
- Supervising and supporting the TB Survivor Network and Leaders, ensuring linkages with health facilities
- Reporting on challenges and progress made



Contribution to the Global Plan to End TB target(s)

Reach at least 90% of all people with TB and place them on appropriate therapy.



Links to National Priorities and the TB Strategic Plan

We aim to contribute to the increase in national TB case detection rates.



Links to Finding the Missing People with TB

Using local community actors, systems, support mechanisms and solutions we aim to reach those who often cannot be reached by health facilities, linking them to TB services and supporting them through care.

About ADPP

ADPP is a Mozambican NGO founded in 1982. Our mission is to address the root causes of poverty through the promotion of social and economic development. We support the most disadvantaged social groups including those living in poverty, women, girls, children. ADPP is a member and co-founder of the Federation HUMANA People to People (HPP), an International Federation of 32 development organizations, working in 43 countries.

TB in Mozambique

Mozambique is one of the high TB burden countries. The overall incidence of TB (551/100,000)¹ hasn't declined in over a decade. Persistent low case detection rates (currently at 45%) is a major challenge, meaning that 55% of the estimated people with TB (total = 85,5301) are missing. The high mortality rate (114/100,000 among the TB/HIV co-infected patients and 75/100,000 among the not co-infected patients¹) is also a matter of great concern and a steady rise of DR-TB patients is an added challenge (3.7% among new patients and 20% among previously treated patients¹).

About CFCS

Stop TB Partnership's Challenge Facility for Civil Society (CFCS) is a unique small grants mechanism that, since 2007, supports innovative community responses to fight tuberculosis (TB). CFCS over the course of 7 rounds has invested in, tested and demonstrated the effectiveness of community responses to strengthen and expand access to quality TB prevention and care services beyond health facilities to settings that cannot be easily reached by public TB programs - US\$ 3 million (approx.) in investments to 130 grantees in over 40 countries. The Stop TB Partnership looks forward to collaborating with, supporting and learning from CFCS Round 8 grantees.
