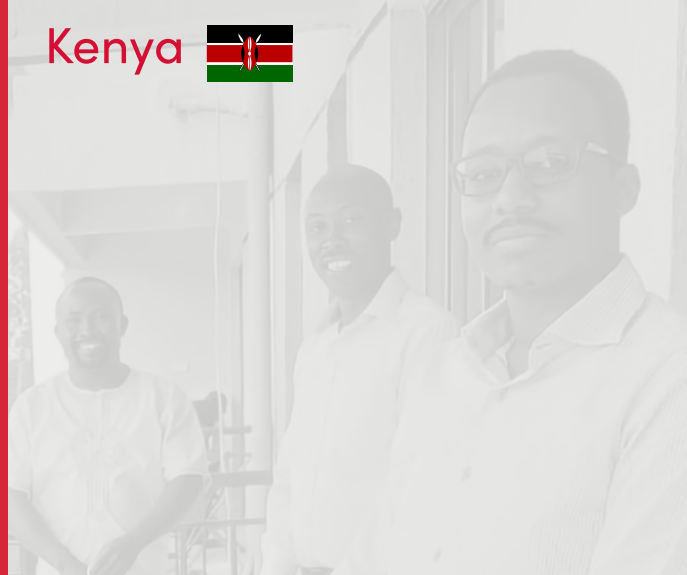

ABOUT THE PROJECT

PROBLEM STATEMENT — The project will address the low allocation of funds from the county levels which affects access to TB services which violates the rights of TB patients. It will also strengthen community-based monitoring and reporting of cases lack of access to TB services and violation of human rights from the community level.

AIM — Building the capacity of TB communities in advocacy and accountability for increased resources for TB in Meru and Kisumu.

OBJECTIVES

- 1 To increase community and civil society leadership and participation in TB response from prioritizing and designing interventions to implementing, monitoring, and evaluating TB services.
- 2 To strengthen community advocacy in the target counties through key stakeholders' engagement and decision-makers.
- 3 To generate strategic information on financial barriers experienced by CSOs working in TB to inform planning and selection of interventions-based data collected/reported through the system and the impact of Covid 19 on TB.

ALIGNMENT WITH NATIONAL PRIORITIES AND THE TB STRATEGIC PLAN. The project will contribute to certain targets in the National TB strategic Plan. These include to remove legal and human rights and gender barriers to access TB, Leprosy and lung disease services. It will also contribute to reduced stigma and discrimination and promote active case finding reaching out to women and other economically disadvantaged populations who have no means to access services without paying for transportation.
