

## **Accelerating Advocacy on TB/HIV**

## **Background**

Of the 33.2 million people living with HIV a third are estimated to also be infected with Tuberculosis (TB). TB remains one of the most common causes of illness and death among people living with HIV, despite being largely curable and preventable. There were an estimated 1.4 million new HIV positive TB patients in 2008, and 500,000 people died of HIV-associated TB. The World Health Organization (WHO) estimates that about one in four (28%) of all HIV deaths is associated with TB. In response, WHO issued a policy for the delivery of integrated TB and HIV services that aims to reduce the burden of TB among people living with HIV and the burden of HIV among TB patients.

The TB/HIV collaborative activities policy outlines 12 steps that national TB and HIV programs must implement in order to respond to TB/HIV co-infection. HIV testing of TB patients has increased substantially over the past 4 years, and in 2008 1.4 million TB patients were tested for HIV. However, the *Three 'I's* (intensified case finding for TB, isoniazid preventive therapy and infection control) which are measures that reduce the burden of TB in people living with HIV, are still not being implemented. In 2008, only 4% of all people living with HIV were screened for TB.

HIV civil society is a key conduit to raising awareness of the issues and bringing about implementation. However, HIV civil society knowledge of the issues and capacity to effectively engage in advocating for those services which reduce the burden of TB in people living with HIV needs to be enhanced. Previous experience shows that involving civil society is crucial to raise awareness and visibility of the key issues at all levels as well as creating demand for services locally.

## Objectives of the workshop

The training curriculum will be based on the joint policy for delivering TB/HIV services and the WHO TB/HIV advocacy training manual and Treatment Action Group community TB/HIV training materials which have been used successfully for other similar workshops.

The one day advocacy workshop will:

- Familiarize participants with the TB/HIV policy, each of the *Three 'I's* as well as key issues such as drug-resistant TB, drug users, the TB/HIV research agenda and need for a point of care diagnostic for TB and key messages.
- ➤ Give participants the opportunity to network with each other and build momentum to catalyze implementation of an approach based on the needs of people in their countries and regions.
- ➤ Help participants identify action steps for TB prevention, screening and treatment for people living with HIV as a component of HIV treatment and care services; and action steps for nationwide expansion of TB infection control in health and congregate settings in the context of HIV/AIDS care and treatment.
